#### Why Reading Non Flction is Important

Last month we celebrated 'Non-fiction November.' Recent research from the National Literacy Trust tells us that children and young people who read non-fiction are more engaged with environmental issues and more likely to want to take care of the environment compared with those who do not read non-fiction. Providing children with the opportunity to read and explore non-fiction plays a vital role in helping them to learn about their world, as well as fostering reading for pleasure. Research shows that the more background knowledge a child brings to their reading, the better their comprehension.

**Top Tip:** Did you know that turning on the subtitles while children are watching television can double the chances of a child becoming good at reading?
